REDUCTION IN LION KILLING IN AREAS WHERE LION GUARDIANS OPERATES SINCE INCEPTION

In early 2014, three lions were killed in areas where we operate. We immediately re-evaluated our model and adapted to the changing situation on the ground.



A boma is a traditional livestock corral. Bomas like this one (pictured right) are vunerable to predator attack if not reinforced.





In May of this year, we reached a tremendous milestone — ten years of data collection on the lions in the Amboseli-Tsavo ecosystem.

From 2007-11, Lion Guardians solely operated in the Amboseli ecosystem. Today, with our partners, we operate at multiple sites across Kenya and Tanzania.



MEMBERS OF THE LION GUARDIANS TEAM

In addition to the near quarter increase in all staff, we also increased the number of Guardians by 32% in 2014, bringing the total to 70 across all sites.




